### **The goals that are to be achieved in the 2021/2022 Academic Year**

Students will continue to work on dissertations, and therefore the seminars of the year 2021-22 will be mostly dedicated to specific subjects directly related PhD projects. However, to avoid to overly separation of students' research areas each third seminar will be prepared jointly by all PhD students on the topic bridging the PhD projects. This format proved successful in the past academic year, and therefore is well worth of continuation. Since the pandemic restrictions are hopefully to be relaxed, the format of the seminar will be further extended by invitation of external guests- experts on the specific topics each seminar, to assure fruitful feedback and cross-fertilization of the ideas.

### **The means that will be used to achieve those goals**

There will be 6 seminars ( 3 seminars/per semester), 3 h each. Two of the three seminars in each semester will be chaired by a respective student. The third seminar in each semester will be prepared jointly by three PhD students participating in the seminar and dedicated to the topic uniting their PhD projects. Each seminar will consist of an introductory presentation by the assigned student or students (45 mins), then shorter interventions followed by general discussion.

### **Proposed dates:**

Thursdays, 2.00 p.m.- 16:30 p.m., on Oct. 28, 2021; Nov. 25, 2021; Jan 27, 2022; March 24, 2022; April 21, 2022 and May 26, 2022.

### **Evaluation policy**

Student's work will be evaluated based on an aggregated score of his/her performance as a chairman, activities during seminars and short essays prepared after each of the seminar. The essays are supposed to concentrate on the relevance of the subject of the seminar to the participant's PhD research project.
