Type/form of class	Seminar: seven four-hour classes (4x45min); a total of 28 hrs
Brief course description	Zadaniem seminarium jest przemyślenie współczesnej koniunktury na dyskurs apokaliptyczny. Od czasów Hegla idea „końca” w filozofii zrobiła zawrotną karierę. Koniec historii stał się warunkiem uzyskania wiedzy kompletnej, a śmierć stała się warunkiem prawdy. Po Heglu, filozofia podbiąała tylko stawki – Nietzsche, Marks, Benjamin, Derrida, Nancy, Girard, Agamben, Žižek, Srnicek, Fisher – poszukiwali ostatecznego scenariusza końca. Różnice diagnozy dotyczyły właściwego terytorium końca – ekonomia, czas, historia, życie, człowieczeństwo, przyroda. W trakcie seminarium spróbujemy zastanowić się nad tym, w jaki sposób można dzisiaj mówić o rozmaitych wizjach „końca”. Czy możliwy jest dyskurs na temat końca poza „apokaliptyczną gorączką” i „eschatologiczną obojętnością”?
	The task of the seminar is to rethink the current situation on apocalyptic discourse. Since Hegel, the idea of “the end” in philosophy has made a career. “The end of history” became a condition for obtaining complete knowledge, and death became a condition of truth. After Hegel, philosophy only conquered stakes – Nietzsche, Marx, Benjamin, Derrida, Nancy, Girard, Agamben, Žižek, Srnicek, Fisher – they all were looking for the final scenario of the end. The differences in diagnosis concerned the proper territory of the end – economics, time, history, life, humanity, nature. During the seminar, we will try to think how we can talk about various visions of the “end” today. Is possible the discourse about the end beyond “apocalyptic fever” and “eschatological indifference”?
